## Jason's Friends ups last year's haul

"Families have to leave Wyoming to get treatment," said Lisa Eades. "We

make sure that they have the ability to concentrate on their sick child."

Karel Loraas cannot estimate the amount of assistance she has gotten from the foundation since her son Clayton, 6, was first diagnosed with leukemia at age 2.

"I would hate to add it up because it would probably scare me to death," Loraas said against the backdrop of falling pins.

Recently, Clayton has relapsed and the family has been in Minnesota for his bone marrow transplant. The family spent almost a year out of state with Clayton.

"We haven't lost our

house and it's basically because of Jason's Friends," she said.
